# GENERAL MEETING MINUTES 7/18/2007

The dessert meeting was called to order at 7:10pm by President, Stu Stuhaug. The pledge of allegiance was lead by Pat Latshaw.

M-2-P to approve the minutes as written.

Old Business - None.

New Business: The President reported on the recent vandalism of 2 boats at the marina last Thursday night. There are legal obligations and moral obligations. The dock committee is handling many changes and updates to the marina at this time. Any volunteers welcomed to help with dock projects. There are bad guys no matter what, land or water. Steps are being taken to handle security. Ann Dearing asked what happened and Teresa Gano explained. There were many expressions of disgust in regards to how the Sheriff's Department handles theft anywhere on the Key Peninsula. Need to watch area and look for strangers - always watch and plan prior to events. Get license plate numbers or something . . . any type of description for people, vehicles, boats, etc.

Only 4 cameras on dock now and need to upgrade to more practical system for our marina. Dean Latshaw, dock chairman, is looking into a new system with 8 cameras and better coverage (visual) and weather protected. Tim Heitzman mentioned that there was an article in the recent mar magazine that did not recommend commend of the commend o

there was an article in the recent marina magazine that did not recommend cameras as they are not up to expectations. Dean is also getting help from the new Neighborhood Policing Deputy, Rich Folden, to address concerns at the marina and get his advice.

Board meeting review: Tim Heitzman was confirmed as treasurer. Vote to streamline the language in rental agreement for Marlies regarding

rentals. There will be a *club wide calendar* of events to as to avoid conflicts. Review to be set for bylaws and dock regulations. Tim was asked to get information on credit card machine to make



things easier for rentals, moorage, etc. Beer will be offered at dinner meetings for \$1.00 donation. All donations will go to the scholarship fund.

Dock Chairman - Dean Latshaw: New BBQ donated by Glen and Debbie Earhardt - THANK YOU!!! Sandy Black has finished getting the lights up. Transients say they cannot see the key pad at night. Dean will follow up on this. Time to dig out your key cards as the gate will be locked at night now. DNR states must be open during daylight hours. Dean is looking at different ideas for surveillance. Needs able bodies for major projects. Many boards need to be sanded and treated before they are lost to weather. Lights at the end of cabana being replaced as well.

Events - Carolyn Wiley: Beyond the Borders August 4th. All positions almost filled after 23 phone calls. Sept 1 is the Labor Day Dance. The permits are in - Tim has designed the posters. Carolyn is looking for a vice chair for events for help and backup. Exercise class still in effect.



Since the mid'60s, The Daily Flash brought a fresh approach to the scene, incorporating, folk, rock, pop, bluegrass and jazz.

A new edition of The Daily Flash has returned. for discerning listeners, The Flash has revived the high art of interpretation. The band features ASCAP composers, but focuses on taking a tune out of its familiar surroundings and making it their own. There's enough recognition to know you've heard the song before, but nothing like the Flash's treatment. They breathe life into an eclectic repertoire of folk, rock, celtic, and contemporary music.

Steve Lalor remains the NW'S quintessential acoustic folk performer. A veteran of the 60's west coast folk scene (*The Driftwood Singers*) and founding member of The Daily Flash, Steve spent 11 years in the L.A. studio scene under contract with London, Universal, MGM, Psycho and Rhino recording companies. His crystal voice and syncopated 6 and 12 string finger picking have been described by Bumbershoot as, "Musicianship that *CRACKLES* with experience."

Barry Curtis, since 1963, has performed with the *Kingsmen* who purvey their seminal form of NW garage rock at arena concerts, fairs and festivals. Ample time between tours allows Barry to pursue other projects. Significant among these is his participation in The Daily Flash. As an electric guitarist, he embodies a wide stylistic range including rural American blues, rock, r&b, country and folk. As a singer, he combines these influences with his formal training in choral music and other forms of harmonic group singing.

Don Wilhelm has been active in the Seattle scene since 1966. He has performed with founding members Roger Fisher and Steve Fossen in White Heart & Heart. He also performed with Shyanne, & with Moby Grape's Don Stevenson in Washington James. Some of his best work also includes composing, recording and performing with Pat Tennis of Los Orchids. Don is both a skilled guitarist and bassist. His unique bass style contributes greatly to The Flash's melodic and rhythmic character and his superb voice soars into alto territory, providing the band with the greatest possible vocal range.

Steve Peterson, also a *Kingsmen* since 1988, is one of the NWQ'S finest drummers. He has done a great deal of studio work and has played in countless other groups ranging from duos to large ensembles. Steve has the ability to play to the essence of virtually every form of popular music. His precision and dynamic range gives The Flash its multi-hued percussive style. His singing and celtic whistle work are compelling and contribute to the group's strong vocal and instrumental capabilities.

Craig Bystrom has been sound engineering for the *Kingsmen* since 1982. Over the years, he has perfected the art of taking all of the individual instruments and voices in a band to create a dynamic group sound in any situation. He brings his wealth of talent and experience to The Flash and enables the band to sound its best at all times.

This lineup has the ability to accurately replicate the vocal and instrumental qualities of the original Flash, and to take that wonderful, explorative musical platform into the future. . .
